Dear MPC Family,

One of the unique joys of being a pastor in the PCUSA is that we are gifted time and resources to continue our education. Each year, pastors are granted two weeks of "Continuing Education," in order to pursue opportunities for growth, education, and renewal. In the fall of 2019, I was selected to be a part of the Zick Scholars Program, a program focused exclusively on the task of



preaching. This program is privately funded by the generosity of Cathy & George Manning, who began the program in memory of Cathy's parents, John and Mary Zick. And alongside five other pastors from around the country, together we have sought to pursue excellence in preaching, learning from experts in the field and from one another. Our cohort facilitator is the Rev. Dr. Tom Tewell, who some of you may remember because Tom came to lead a Session Retreat for us back in January of 2018. Tom was in pastoral leadership for over forty years, serving in churches around the country and most recently serving as the senior pastor of Fifth Avenue Presbyterian Church in New York City. Since that time, he founded the Macedonian Ministry Foundation, and in his retirement now serves as a pastoral and leadership consultant for pastors all around the country. Tom is a gifted preacher and teacher, and it has been wonderful to work with him in the Zick Scholars Program.

I share all this with you because I always want you to know the kinds of things I am pursuing when I am away for continuing education. But I also want you to know a little bit more about this program as we enter the season of Advent. Why? Because my friends and colleagues in the Zick Scholars Program are uniquely contributing to our worship and educational life this Advent. Together, we are working our way through Advent, challenging each other in preaching and benefiting from the gifts and insight of the Rev. Dr. Luke Powery (Dean of the Chapel at Duke University), who has consulted with our group on a number of occasions. You can read more about these Advent plans on page 4 of this issue of Currents.

But for now, I hope you will join me in celebrating the connectional church in which we dwell. When we have so many of our own traditions and celebrations (especially during Advent & Christmas), it's easy to forget the vast number of churches and congregations who also journey through Advent alongside us. But in this particular year, we will not only have companions on the journey, we will have five other churches committed to praying for us and for our worship life this season. Five other congregations (from all over the country) who will be giving thanks this Advent for Morrisville Presbyterian Church. I hope you will join me this Advent season in praying for each of these congregations, and I also pray that the Spirit will move through our collective witness this season in beautiful and powerful ways.

#### GAINING MOMENTUM TOWARD THE FUTURE

Dear Priesthood of All Believers,

Much to my surprise, he pauses. "Well I just moved upstairs." "Oh. That's a big deal," I replied, "Do you like being upstairs now?" Seeing that he wasn't brimming with enthusiasm about the new move, I changed tactics: "Moving classes can be hard. Do you miss your old class?" "Yes," he admits. "But we celebrated my friend's birthday yesterday! There were donuts! And I got gummies!" My conversation partner finally beams when telling me this, then he darts off to the playground as our dialogue is brought to a fittingly abrupt end.

This brief conversation was a personal highlight of mine during our Grounded in Grace picnic this last September. On face value, it might seem simple or insignificant that I discussed graduating from one pre-school class to another with a child of the church as they stared intently at their Rita's water ice. But for the



past few years, these kind of interactions have been few and far between. With the many different chapters of the pandemic, it has been hard to build momentum around gathering in the many ministries of our church across all ages. I am not sure if you have noticed, but during this fall something has changed.

Much to my surprise, Sunday School rooms have filled larger than expected. More kids are scurrying down to Time for Young Disciples and are eager to sing with Tim at Time for Music. Adult Sunday School has been brought back to the conference room. New groups have gathered to discern the church's relationship to racism. Youth Club returned to our weekly meals. We even have had a Men's Retreat and restarted some Men's Ministry gatherings. Like a clutch play in the dying moments of a game, the momentum has shifted. People are able to gather more freely in faithful study, fellowship, and service; and it feels great. The work of Sunday school teachers, committee members, and faithful volunteers are paying off as we see tons of smiles in the church and hear echoes of voices in the hallways. We give thanks to God for the ability to gather for worship and nurture.

So now what? With this new found momentum, I have been wondering what church will my Rita's eating, four year old conversation partner inherit when he is older? I have been asking myself the question, "Are we maintaining an institution, or are we making disciples?" While we have been hurt by the ways the pandemic has impacted our church these past few years, I have seen blessings of resurrection amidst the ashes. There was a recentering on what was most important and emerging abilities as we were forced to create something new. So, there is an invitation before us to marry our new momentum with the core of the Gospel: to love of our God and to love of our neighbor. As long as this principal is at the center of what we keep doing, a future vision of the church will begin to develop.

While my impulse has been to bring people back into our church walls, our session has been going out into the community to listen and learn how we can be better neighbors in Morrisville. Separate committees have been using our new found skills of flexibility and collaboration to host new events at Snipes Farm and the local brewery in town. We even inaugurated our first Mission Sunday where congregation members shared testimonies of where they see God acting in the mission activity of MPC.

In all these things, and in so much more, I have seen moments of momentum for which to give deep thanks, and exciting pockets of vision for the future of this church. So I hope you will join us, however you feel called, to follow Jesus Christ in this way as we seek to make disciples of all ages and love our God and our neighbor here in Morrisville.

## ADVENT SERMON SERIES, RISE UP SHEPHERD!

We have a unique opportunity this Advent! As part of the Zick Preaching Scholars, Rachel has joined with pastors from five other Presbyterian congregations to put together an Advent series for 2022. These pastors serve congregations in California, Pennsylvania, Tennessee, Virginia, and Wisconsin. Each of the pastors will be sharing in the planning and writing of liturgy for the Sundays, and the group has contracted the Rev. Dr. Luke Powery, Dean of the Chapel at Duke University, to provide a series of study videos that we will be incorporating into our Advent Adult Education Series. Additionally, we will be using Dr. Powery's Advent Devotional, *Rise Up Shepherd!: Advent Reflections on the Spirituals*, as a guide for personal spiritual reflection. Copies will be available in the Communication Center.

The Zick Preaching Scholars is a program sponsored by George and Cathy Manning in memory of her parents John and Mary Zick, longtime members of the Fifth Avenue Presbyterian Church in New York City. The group is facilitated by former Fifth Avenue senior pastor, the Rev. Dr. Tom Tewell.

## HOLIDAYS, "HOLY DAYS," AND "GOOD DAYS"

The "holidays" are here! My dictionary defines "holiday" as "a day of freedom from work." That definition did not come from a farmer! Having grown up on a farm, my "holiday" was a few hours between rounds of chores and after they were all finished.

My dictionary also defines "holiday" as "a day set aside for special religious observance." I would like to call that a "holy day." As we come to the end of the calendar year, we have Thanksgiving and Christmas, both of which I would like to characterize as "holy days." They are primarily times of acknowledging the presence of God in our lives and celebrating divine deliverance, providence, and grace. But often, these holidays are more closely aligned with the secular festivities of eating, football, family, and gifts.



The word "holiday" is scarcely mentioned in the Bible. Of course, the Hebrews had and continue to have special Jewish days for making sacrifices and for religious observances, such as Passover. The Hebrew words literally mean "a good day." The biblical reference is in the Book of Esther referring to the feast of Purim celebrating deliverance from Israel's enemies. It was a happy or festal day that gave expression through games, merriment, noisemaking, and "playing mummers." Sounds like New Year's Day! That is coming, too!

Whatever the nature of your holidays, may they include remembering the "Giver" of all life and the feast. Spending time to reflect on God's goodness and expressing gratitude for it, infuses an element of what is "holy" into any day and can make it "good."





#### MEN'S RETREAT

The Men's Retreat was held on Saturday, October 8, at Snipes Farm and Education Center. The men of MPC worked on two projects supporting Snipes' mission to plant water-loving native plants in the recently created "bioretention basin," and plant trees adjacent to the basin. The bio-retention basin lies at the heart of efforts to harvest flooding reaching the farm from the surrounding developed areas, so that water recharges and feeds the streams during times of drought. Trees near the basin and streams help to clean water as it moves over and under
