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Pastor's Pen

Dear MPC Family,

In worship recently we've been talking about creating some, "Breathing Room" in our life and worship together. Breathing room that reminds us who we are and whose we are. And breathing room that slows us down and reminds us that no matter what is going on around us in the wider world, it is in God that we live and move and have our being.

But it's hard to find that breathing room. In the midst of the hurried nature of our lives, the endless to-do lists, and the work and family demands that never stop, we've often fallen into the myth that creating this kind of intentional space is impossible; that we can't rest; that the world will stop spinning if we take time to breathe.

And this is one of the reasons I have found the story of Mary and Martha so helpful. In the gospel text (Luke 10:38-42), Mary is found sitting at the feet of Jesus and hanging on his every word. Meanwhile, Martha is busily preparing everything for the home and the meal. Martha complains to Jesus that Mary isn't helping and Jesus responds by saying, 'Martha, Martha, you are worried and distracted by many things; there is need of only one thing. Mary has chosen the better part, which will not be taken away from her.' For anyone who considers themselves a "Martha" most of the time, these feel like harsh words coming from Jesus.

But I think these words may be more nuanced than they first appear. So rather than simply dismissing Jesus' gentle rebuke, or assuming that Martha is a frivolous woman consumed with frivolous things (an easy interpretation to fall into), I've tried to ask harder questions of the text and wonder what Jesus was doing with this gentle reminder for Martha. After all, Martha was exactly the type of host Jesus told his disciples to expect, and exactly the kind of person who lived her faith in the "doing" You wouldn't want a faith that failed to produce any sort of faithful response in the "doing" needed in the world!

This idea of "breathing room" was exactly the lens I needed to help me understand Jesus' words with a new perspective. If we see Mary as being one who sits at Jesus' feet and inhales the love of God, perhaps Martha is the one who exhales the love of God out into the world. But Jesus reminds Martha that both are needed—the inhale and the exhale—you can't just exhale forever. And I think Jesus ached for Martha because she felt so consumed with the exhale that the inhale wasn't given much thought. Certainly, most of the time she gave and gave of herself expecting nothing in return, but then there were moments she found herself bitter and full of judgment or criticism when a thank you note didn't arrive in the mail, or the casserole dish took too long to return, or no one asked an eighth time if she needed any help because she'd already said no the first seven. I think Jesus knew the toll this constant exhale took on Martha, whether she was willing to admit it or not. And he gently encouraged her to remember that the breathing room needed to inhale God's love was just as important as the opportunities to exhale God's love.

I think Jesus knows the toll this constant exhale can take on us too. I think Jesus sees the gifts we have to offer and affirms them and welcomes them in this world. But I think Jesus also wants to remind us that our ability to exhale God's love into the world is dependent upon our willingness to inhale it too. Jesus wants us to know that we are loved simply for being who we are and not for anything we've ever done. This gift that Christ offers is not one we could earn if we tried and it's not something we could ever lose. Because "the better part" that Jesus points to comes as a gift—a pure and sacred gift.

So in these summer months, beloved church, I hope you will take time to inhale that gift. Maybe you will find that inhale in worship, in prayer, in breathing in and out, or in saying "yes" to something life-giving and soul-nourishing when you still have 1000 things on your to-do list. Because the 1000 things will always be there. We will always have opportunities to exhale God's love. But we're encouraged to take time to inhale it, too, so that when we do exhale it into the world, we can do so with generosity, and with grace, and with the same love that God first offered us. I hope and pray you find ways to inhale God's love in the weeks and months to come!

Dear Priesthood of All Believers,

The ground was slanted. The tables were simple. The food was pizza. But if you listened, you could hear an invitation to witness something grand. “My favorite activity was when we did the escape room at Solid Rock Youth Center.” “I loved when we played grog (hide and seek) in the church.” “My favorite thing we did was Youth Sunday...I still have my bulletin in my room.”

These were some of the many memories our youth shared at their last Youth Club gathering before the summer break. In May we celebrated the end of our year together over pizza, popcorn, and soda recounting the “highs and lows” we shared since September. It certainly was a year full of ups and downs, but what has been constant is that our youth have talked through it all. Like the loud sound of birds waking you up early in the morning, our youth have had a hard time keeping from talking with one another whenever they are together. In the fall they were quick to share their highs and lows. During the omicron variant, they talked through the inconsistency and unknown—picking up conversations from the week before even though we moved from place to place trying to find a home to gather. And finally in our memorial garden, during a pizza party, it was fitting that we ended around a table swapping stories about the fun we had this year. As someone who was privileged enough to witness this cacophony of conversation for months, I give thanks for what it says to me: even in the pandemic, our youth are finding community and belonging in a world that desperately needs it.



Many people have worked hard to create community, belonging, and space for deeper faith formation over the course of this 2021-2022 church year. From pre-k all the way through adults, many church members have given their time and heart to helping others come closer to God through our Sunday School classes. At times this has looked like divine revelation where someone has an “aha” moment in faith, and other times it has been the challenge of empty classrooms due to the unreliability of the pandemic. So I hope you will join me in thanking the teachers listed below who are the very definition of what it means to be resilient in faith during a difficult time:

Like the members who marched up Pennsylvania Avenue on Easter morning in 1952 to worship God in the sanctuary we call home today, we walk in the footsteps of the saints before us to see where in Morrisville God is calling us next. I hope you will join us in this prayer and discernment.


CLASS OF 2022






YOU CAN BE THE ANSWER TO PRAYER

It has been written: “True prayer is a way of life; the truest life is literally a way of prayer.” If we as Christians expect to follow the true life in Christ, then our life is sustained and recharged by prayer. That is why prayer is an important element of private devotions and public worship. Prayer as the essential basis of a Christian life, though, in reality, it is a combination of factors: offering prayer, receiving prayer, and being the answer to prayer. Most of us know how to pray. You find a quiet spot, bow your head, and talk to God. If we have faith grounded upon the Word of God, we have the beginnings of right prayer. There is no special time, place, or position in which to pray. You address God, the Almighty and Creator. Believe a few simple facts when you pray:

- Believe that Christ loves you even more than you love yourself. The cross is evidence of this.
- Believe that all power is God’s – physical and spiritual.
- Believe that God is right there with you when you pray.



How do you feel about receiving prayer? To receive prayer means to ask for it. I have known many people who feel that asking for prayer is a selfish act and that it is better to pray for someone or something rather than “pray for me.” However, many of the people on the church’s prayer list have made that request themselves. Each week, members of the congregation gather and pray for all the people on the list. **If you would like to have your name added to our prayer list, or to receive prayer in private, call or send an email any of the Pastors. Or, fill out a pray request card that can be found in the card holders in every pew, and place it in the offering plate.**

You are an answer to prayer:

- When you help your neighbor by offering a ride or a helping hand,
- When you volunteer to be a teacher or work in the food center,
- When you assert yourself to right a wrong,
- When you make a financial commitment to this congregation, and,
- When food, clothing, and charitable gifts go out from this church to meet the needs of others.

Offering or receiving prayer is an act of faith. Also, when you engage in acts of kindness and justice, you can be an answer to someone’s prayer for that very thing. Just a coincidence? Maybe, maybe not! The church works by and through the love of Jesus Christ powered by the Holy Spirit. It is my prayer that the prayer life of the faithful cease to be a boring routine or haphazard activity but become a way of life, rich and fulfilling.


